
PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

It is now almost two months since we opened the workshop at Ourimbah. Everyone who has seen the workshop has expressed very positive comments and we look forward to a successful rejuvenation of CCWT. We are still in the process of sorting through boxes and crates of "stuff" that we accumulated during sixteen years at the Wyong Milk Factory. We are still not up to speed on some issues, one of which is our monthly meetings. For the time being they will continue at The Alison Homestead though it is my intention, when we can organise it, to return the



meetings to the workshop... in this case Ourimbah. This would enable us to keep the workshop open in the mornings, followed by a BBQ and our Club Meeting. Perhaps members could discuss this at the next meeting which is on Saturday 4th May. Unfortunately, I am an apology for this meeting, as I am holiday.


We were able to hold our delayed Board meeting last Wednesday. Following the Treasurer's report, the Board discussed our annual membership fee. Garry presented some possible future finance figures based on an assumed membership and assumed numbers using the workshop each week. This was very hard to predict as we had been closed for a period of 14 months that followed the uncertainty of Covid restrictions. Whilst we would be able to continue as we are at the moment, we cannot rely on the good nature and hard work of the few people who regularly put their hand up for money raising opportunities. We cannot rely on Bunnings and BBQs and sales to avoid a hand to mouth type future. The annual fee has stood at \$45 for some years now, as well as the \$5 fee for using the workshop. Whilst we have decided to keep the workshop fee at \$5 per session the Board felt it was necessary to



increase our annual fee to \$60. Research of other similar clubs show that on the whole our fees are well below other groups. This increase will secure the clubs finances and ensure that we go forward in a strong position. I believe that most members will happily accept this increase but should it prove particularly difficult for anybody please speak confidentially with an y member of the board.

Other points of discussion at the Board meeting included the agreement to build some sort of woodstore behind the container at the workshop. To this end we have already placed some plastic pallets in position. In the first instance the wood will be covered by some corrugated sheeting, currently leaning against the fence. This will be weighed down by the two rusting truck wheel rims. In due course we will construct a more permanent roof structure. The success of the woodstore rests with those

members who avail themselves of the opportunity to get wood. It must not be treated in the same way the wood seems to have been at Alan Smith's. Here people have destroyed carefully stacked wood in order to get the piece or pieces they want with no thought of putting the pile back together. This has resulted in once again the pile becoming unsightly and good wood left exposed to the elements.



Brian 'Skeeta' Wilson will be running a course to train instructors for the club. He tried several times to get this course started before the restrictions imposed during the Covid period kept shutting him down. If you think you might be interested in becoming an instructor, please get in touch with Brian or myself.

So here we are. I know the workshop is not everything we were hoping for but we are secure for the next few years. Work will soon commence of securing our even longer-term future. To do this we need committed members on the Board and get them in place so they can oversee the remaining years at Ourimbah. We cannot just sit back and rest for long because if we do, we will see time slip by very quickly and 2029 will be upon us. At this moment in time, we have no

carvers on the Board. We have no ladies on the Board. There will be vacancies on the board at the next couple of AGMs so think hard, could you have a part to play in the long-term future of CCWT.

In finishing my report for this month, it has been pleasing to welcome several new members as well as some returning members. Attendance at the workshop has been patchy and not nearly enough to sustain the opening hours we have at the moment. On the last two Saturdays we have had three people attend to turn. Last Friday two instructors and myself were there to greet three people. In my last report I invited members to get back to me if they would like to discuss a more convenient time for opening, perhaps an afternoon or evening. As yet there have been no requests.
