PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

I can't believe that another month has gone by. Where is 2019 going?

A few weeks back I was watching television, probably sport, when somebody said:

I thought about this and for me, in terms of woodturning, I cannot agree. In board meetings we have been discussing increasing participation in the club. Well, reversing the above statement, I have to say, for me, it is the journey that counts. For us the destination must be the product at the end of the process, a piece of turning or a carving. While bowls etc. can be very attractive I enjoy the whole process involved in the production of that object. Never has this been more in evidence than the past month.



I spoke about collecting some banksia from a farm in Mangrove Mountain. We were fortunate in being able to go back for a second 'dig' at this wood. Dom Pirlo, Tony Hartmann and I took Alan's trailer to this farm and filled it with very colourful banksia. Last weekend I accompanied Dom Pirlo and Garry Buckman to Casino. Here we were able to fill a trailer with mango. It may seem a long way to go just for a trailer of wood but just the whole experience of a three-day trip with other club members was fantastic.

Hopefully by the time you read this edition of the Hobby Turner we will have a supply of English Oak at Alan's. This is a lovely story. A lady phoned Garry Buckman offering wood from an English Oak, which she reluctantly had to have felled. She was adamant it was an English Oak as she had grown it herself from acorns collected in Hyde Park in Sydney. These oaks had in turn been grown from acorns collected in Hyde Park in London. She was sad to see the tree go but the roots were starting to become invasive but she was anxious to see as much of the wood as possible put to some use rather than going in the chipper. This was to be another opportunity for a few club members to spend a morning collecting the wood and taking it to Alan's for the benefit of club members. Hopefully this will happen next week.

There was no business arising from the minutes.



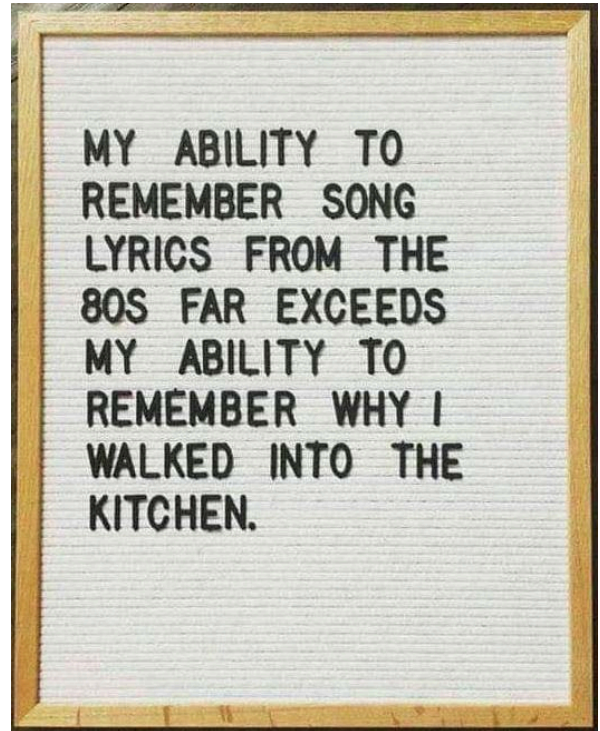
Coming Events:

Westfield Tuggerah has been approached to supply additional toys at a discount.

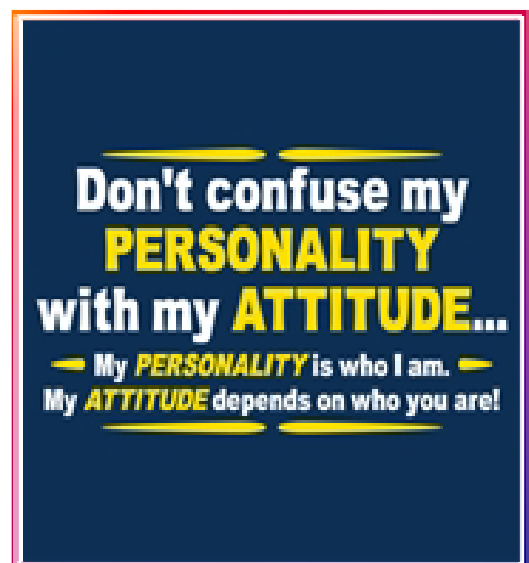
The raffle prizes for the Toy Fund were won by Tanya and Tony.

General Business:

1. The banner for the Craft Extravaganza is being made and will be available soon.
2. The Club AGM will be held in October and the September meeting will be an ordinary meeting. Special thanks to John Butlin for volunteering to chair the September meeting and to Alan Smith for volunteering to record the minutes.
3. Ron Gibbs was approached by David Hannan for members to assist with the construction of a memorial wall for Vietnam veterans. Members have agreed to participate and will source suitable timber for this project.
4. Alan Smith informed members that there is a good collection of timber stored at his place. Members who wish to get some for their use are asked to contact Alan. Members are asked to donate \$5 per piece. Large pieces may be more.

7. John Butlin suggested that the Club should look at having regular sales at the Milk Factory – perhaps in conjunction with our monthly meetings. John Lea will discuss this idea with the Milk Factory management to see if it would be approved.
8. Steve Farr suggested that the Club consider some of the programs and strategies used by the NSW Woodworkers' Association to help increase our membership. More guest speakers and demonstrators could be investigated.
9. There was considerable discussion about the time and venue of the monthly meetings. Members were divided on this issue – travelling at night was of concern to several members. The matter is under consideration and will be discussed further at future meetings.

The bull started to service the cows within two days, all my cows!

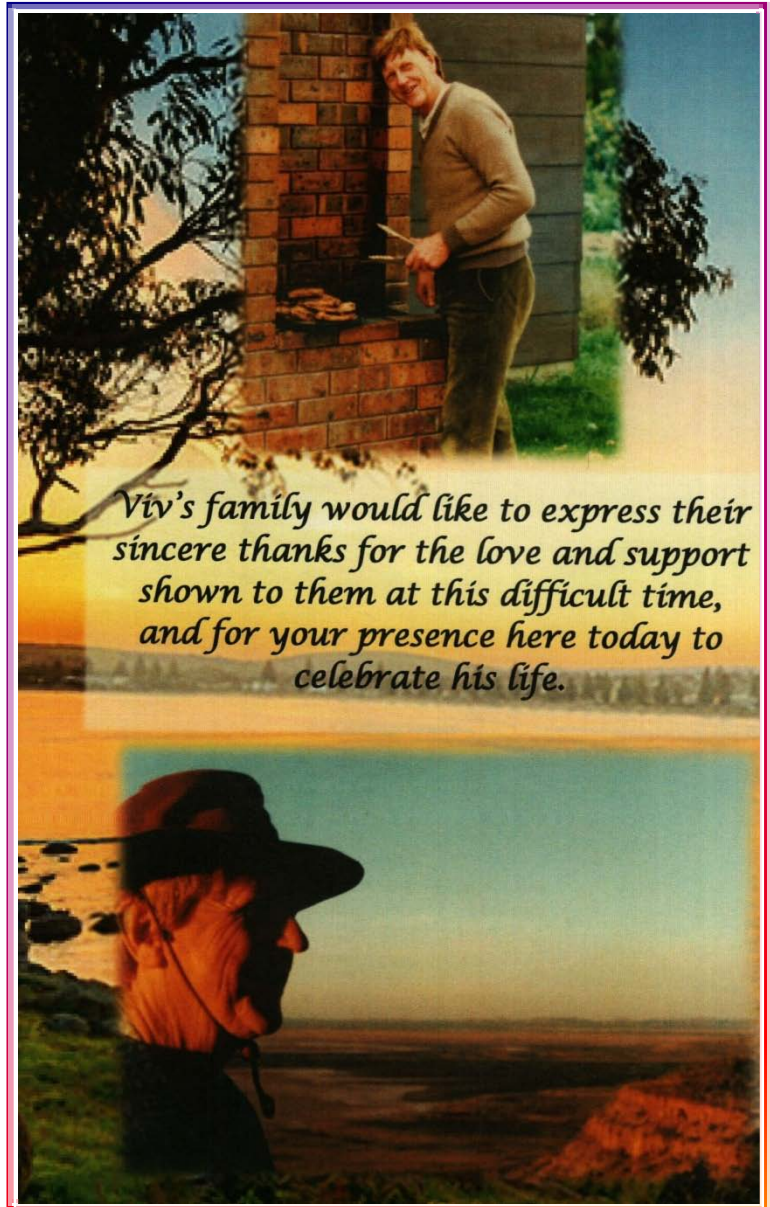
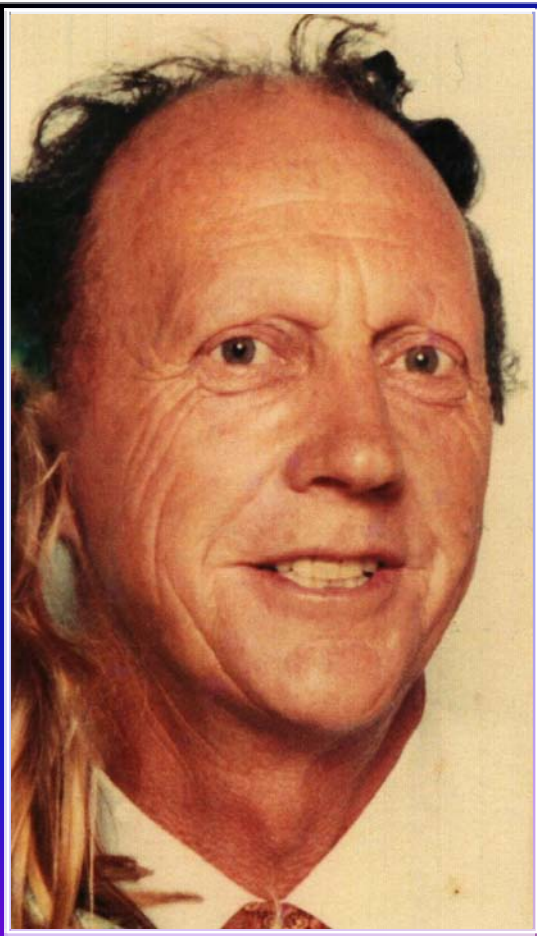
He even broke through the fence and bred with all of my neighbour's cows!

Hi Folks,

As you are probably aware, we are hosting the Central Coast Craft Extravaganza in the grounds of the Wyong Milk Factory on 16th and 17th of November. We will be demonstrating and selling all our crafts at this event (all commission from the sales will go to the Central Coast Outreach Centre... one of our favoured charities). Commission for the event, as we don't have to pay additional rent, will be 10% of all items sold.

During normal sales it is expected that those that are selling items will be there to assist at the tables, for this event we are only asking that they be available for some time over the weekend, so the more we have selling the less time you will be expected to attend.

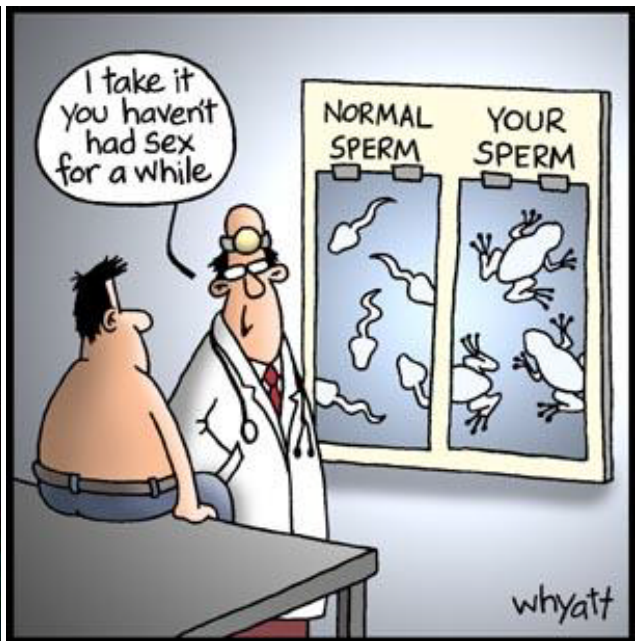
Hi Folks,
