PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

The idea that this has been an up and down year is a gross understatement. Just as we were finally over Covid-19 restrictions and starting to get the Club back to what was going to be a post-lockdown existence we were shocked by a rent increase from the Milk Factory. Because the original lease had lapsed some time in 2006 there was no legal document preventing the Milk Factory increasing our rent ten-fold. So, on November 16th 2022 we finally left our workshop. This year has therefore been largely dominated by our search for new premises



As we debated at our last AGM where we might go one avenue after another was closed to us. We looked at schools, which had been empty for a decade. We looked at guide, scout and church halls which were all unsuitable for our needs. The Central Coast Council had nothing. Requests and meetings with Federal, State and locally elected politicians all came to nought. During all this time we never lost our optimism that we had an opportunity to come back as a larger and improved Club.


We were fortunate to have a generous offer from Alan Smith. He agreed that we could position two containers on his property. One was purchased by the Club and the other by



Alan. All our equipment has been packed into these containers but maintenance is out of the question without completely unpacking the equipment.

I don't want to jump the gun but there is a distinct possibility that our search may be at an end. We are currently negotiating two possible leases. Central Coast Council, having at first nothing to offer, have given us verbal permission to build a workshop at the Alison Homestead Museum. The delay in proceedings here is that we will have to get a sub-lease from the Museum who have only just finalised their own lease with the Council. Now that has been done, we are already in discussions with the new President of the Museum. You will understand that any conclusion to negotiations and the completion of any workshop on this site is some time down the line.

After initially discounting the Guide Hall in Ourimbah because of the upfront costs to the building and grounds the situation changed. The Guides, having at first wanting to sell the property, came back to us with the possibility of a lease. Whilst the same issue of repairs

still exists the time frame has been altered. We have verbal agreement to a three-year lease, with the possibility of a further three years. At the moment we are in discussions over the wording of any lease and trying to ensure that we have security of tenure over the period of the lease. The rent requested is in the range we can afford but that also has to be agreed on paper.

Both arrangements have advantages and disadvantages. The museum means we could build a workshop to our specification. The disadvantage is we would only ever have a five-year lease, which would need to be constantly renewed. The Ourimbah Guide Hall, while on the small side, would provide a larger workshop area than we had at Wyong. While it does have a small kitchen area and garage, which would make a good shop, it does not have separate rooms for other crafts. There is also a large outside area for parking.

I have to commend the work done by the members of the Board and others in reaching this stage. There have been many visits to possible sites. Members have been falling back on friends and acquaintances that might know of suitable premises. Meetings of small committees and morning tea meetings in local cafes to discuss information and leads. The optimism and belief that this would lead to better things was never in doubt. The possible demise of the club was never a thought and so, thanks to all that effort, we have reached our present position.

What I didn't say earlier is that we would have instant access to the guide hall as soon as we have signed the lease. Indeed, so confident are the guides that we have even been given a key for the hall so we can gauge what we will need to do before moving in. This work is already under way and visits to the hall, for the purpose of pricing electrics and flooring, have already taken place. A second advantage of the guide hall is we would be able to get all our equipment out of storage and begin maintenance and repair. While we might have instant access it would be a short while before we would be ready to start Club activities.


So, our feeling is, at the moment, we go with the lease for the guide hall. While not perfect it means we can be up and running again in the near future. This will give us time to complete negotiations with the Museum and fundraise for our new workshop. Also, we could always accept the offer from the guides of the option to purchase the Ourimbah site.

While a new workshop has occupied much of our time, what else has been happening over the past 12 months. Without a workshop many members have retreated to their own workshops and continue to turn wood. Members have stayed in touch and we have continued

our monthly meetings. The Alison Homestead have generously allowed us to hold these meetings, plus Board meetings, at the Museum, even furnishing us with a key so we could use the facilities at the Homestead.

As well as a number of workdays to clear and tidy our old workshop before leaving, we have had other days. These include sorting and restacking the wood at Alan's yard. People were quick to unstack wood to find the best piece for their project, but reluctant to restack. Some of the wood was past its best, to say the least, so this was set aside in a separate pile for firewood. We have also been out collecting wood. A recent acquisition was some Chinese Elm, something I had never heard of before.

A new venture, now that the Club had no income, was to provide a Bunnings BBQ. Our first such event was on a Sunday at Tuggerah. This raised nearly \$2,000, while the second on a Saturday at the same venue raised \$2,300. While these are quite intense workwise, they were good fun and raise considerable funds.



With the workshop closed many of us miss the friendship and companionship of a group of like-minded people. To compensate for this some of our members, myself included, have joined a local Men's Shed. We now have about seven former CCWT members at Erina Men's Shed. Others have joined other Sheds. We have been warmly greeted and quickly settled into a familiar environment. The Erina Men's Shed recently took part in a Fair-Trade Market at the adjoining Baptist Church. I offered a woodturning demonstration and we had a sales table. Everything sold was for our building fund and we raised about \$1,000. On the same day as the AGM there will be another sale at Bateau Men's Shed. This is thanks to Graham Craike and all sales will go to our building fund.

In conclusion, I feel more than ever the Club has been presented with a new and exciting opportunity. Older members of the Club remind us that CCWT existed for quite a few years before they got a workshop. While it is exciting that we now have two opportunities to explore there still remains the mammoth task of fund raising. This is not just the job of Board members, or the few who put their hands up, but a task for all of us.

I look forward to seeing many of you at the AGM on Saturday when we can explain and detail what exactly is being offered and negotiated. We will explain what this might mean for us in the future of CCWT.

and technical hand skills as well as answering the many questions from the attendees.



EDITOR'S NOTE:

Hi Folks,

I've had a very interesting few weeks to say the least and this is a quick note to fill you in.

For a couple of months, I felt that my asthma was getting much worse and I would get severely puffed just going to the mailbox.

I also thought that I had injured my left shoulder as I was getting a lot of pain there too, especially after walking.

The short story is, that I made a doctor's appointment a couple of weeks ago on the Tuesday at 5pm and I was admitted to hospital 2hrs

later.

They did all sorts of tests and they said that I had probably had a mild heart attack sometime in the preceding week.

On the Wednesday morning I was visited by a heart specialist who said that the ultrasound showed that I had **NOT** damaged my heart.

He also said that there was a build-up of fluid around my heart and this was causing the swelling in my legs and lower back and much of the shortness of breath.

I was sent to Nth Gosford Private on Thursday morning for an angiogram later that day.

During the procedure he found that "the main artery to the heart" was 90 – 95% blocked but he said that he would fix it straight away.

After clearing the blockage, he installed a stent.

He said that the blockage etc was not weight or health related and that it could happen to anyone, even professional athletes.

However, I have taken this as a serious wake up call.

Hopefully, I'll quickly get some energy back and get back into an exercise routine.

I have a few extra tablets to take each day but that's a small price to pay for a second chance at life.

There are three messages here:

- ✚ Firstly, superheroes are around us every day. They don't wear masks and capes, but they wear the uniforms of our nurses, doctors, police, firies, ambo's etc.
- ✚ Secondly, take care of your health and take notice of the warning signs that your body gives you. **We are no longer 25 and bulletproof.**
- ✚ Lastly, do all of the things that you have dreamed of NOW. Don't wait until things get better or the time is right. You may not be blessed with that opportunity... and for heaven's sake tell your loved ones how special they are to you. Do it today!
