
#### PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

Well, here we are at the time for the AGM. This will be my last report as President of CCWT. It is six years since I was elected and what a ride it has been. In 2018 I was still fairly new to the Club and took a while after the election to get a grasp on matters in hand. I visited the sales offered by the Club in shopping centres and other venues. I attended the workshop at Wyong on different sessions in order to get to know as many members as possible.

Soon after becoming President Covid-19 started to be a huge news event and it wasn't long before it arrived in

Australia. Before the pandemic hit us, we had a healthy membership well in excess of 100. I don't need to remind members of the effects of Covid on the day to day running of the Club. The Board was kept busy organising and reorganising workshop sessions in order to keep as much of the club open as possible. Lathes were mothballed in order to comply with distance regulations etc. Though the membership dropped during Covid we came through it and were able to open again and continue with our hobby.

The next hurdle put in our way was a huge increase in rent for our workshop at the Milk Factory. This required us to move out and find new site. This left us homeless for 14 months but thanks to the diligence of members in seeking new facilities we were able to negotiate a five-year lease with the Girl Guides for the disused guide hut in Ourimbah. So, it was on



January 1<sup>st</sup> this year we moved into our new workshop. The amount of work put in by the Board and Club members has given us the facility we enjoy today.

The reason I remind you all is to show that a Club like ours is only as good as its members. We currently have a membership just over 50. Just last week we had four new members begin their introduction. Too many people to list were involved in getting us to the point we are today. Unfortunately, we are able to look into the future and realise all to soon our tenure of the Guide Hall will be over. Even though that time looks a long way away Board members are busy trying to negotiate with the Guides the possibility of extending our lease or even of purchase of the property. Fund raising will become a major part of our future growth and sustainable future.

I have mentioned the Board several times already in this report. I could not have continued to be President for the length of time I have without the continued commitment of Board members and their fantastic support. Some of the Board are stepping down at the end of this month. Some of those members have been on the Board, guiding the Club, for many years.



Some new faces, and therefore new ideas, are needed. I personally want to thank all those Board members, past and present, who have made this Club we all enjoy the way it is.

OK, there was a bit of downtime as well as after dinner discussions and a tipple or two, some of slightly dubious nature.

During the past six years I have been exposed to and introduced to many new experiences. During this time much of my interest has shifted from photography to wood turning. Initially, when I joined the Club, it was, like many people, to revisit some crafts I had experienced as a child or early adulthood. I am thankful that some of the skills developed during my working career were of benefit to the Club and helped us survive the two great upheavals of the past few years and, not only to survive, but emerge much stronger in our belief that there is a future, not only for our Club, but also for the craft of woodturning.

Many thanks for the past six years. Here's to the future of CCWT.


**Financial Report:** Garry presented the reports for July 2024.



I've given most of the timber to the Club and it will be transported there for storage very soon. It has beautiful colour and really clears the sinuses.


Pieces will be available for sale soon, with the money going to the Toy Fund.

## Turn-Up... 2024... Lake Keepit.

Some time ago a flyer turned up on the table at the workshop. Despite being the wrong year (Turn-Up 2021) and having the wrong dates it caused sone discussion. Over the next few weeks, the flyers lay on the table until Ron Gibbs informed us, he had signed up and gave the correct dates for 2024.

In my teaching career I had attended many 'conferences' so Turn-Up 2024 interested me. "You will learn lots." said Ron.

Bring your own lathe and table. Bring your own wood and tools. Bring your own bed linen or sleeping bag. This was nothing like any conference I had attended in the past but even so I signed up and paid my money.



Ron and I decided we would share a car and therefore only take one lathe between us. The day before we packed the car at the workshop, and next day, Friday, put our clothes and bedding in the car and off we went.

A little over five hours later we arrived at NSW Sports and Recreational Facility. Two of our members remember this place from their teaching days. I am pleased to say, what is there now, bore little resemblance to the facility they remember.





On arrival we went straight up to the dining hall for lunch. More on the catering later. After lunch we went to the hall where the event was based. A large hall with a hard floor, high ceilings and numerous doors to the outside... so open that the swallows were flying in and out of the building.

Altogether there were about 20 attendees. There were other crafts, not just turning. Scroll-sawers, pyrographers and engravers were all there.

There were no demonstrations, workshops or commercial woodturning related sales. The whole two days were just individuals doing their own work. This resulted in me having the luxury of almost sole use of the lathe we had brought and my own individual instructor. When I needed a rest Ron did turn a bowl and started on a small vase.





But what of the weekend as a whole. \$350 dollars was the cost, plus our own travel expenses. We travelled in Ron's car and shared the driving. Sleeping arrangements had worried me until we arrived. Many people paired up as we had and were each allocated one of the rooms used by the children attending the facility. This consisted of a room with five double bunks. We had shower and toilet facilities next door, very handy for gentlemen of our age!

All food was included, three courses at most meals and a wide choice of meals. Morning and afternoon tea, cakes, buns and scones were also provided, with tea, coffee and soft drinks available all day. Basically, there was nothing to spend your money on and no facility to spend money.

In my opinion this was the best \$350 I have paid for two days full accommodation plus the ability to spend two days on the lathe. The people, both attendees and facility staff, were very friendly and helpful. There was a great deal of catching up, as well as the exchange of ideas. Word soon spread that I made a lot of pens and people were constantly brining me offcuts for pen blanks. In the evening, after dinner, you were still able to spend time on the lathe, or whatever, or most gathered around a table and enjoyed a general chat aided by the





consumption of various alcoholic beverages people had brought with them.

The accommodation was good with air-conditioned rooms. The food was excellent and the facility staff generous with their time. I cannot praise this event enough and I am certainly hoping it will be offered again next year. If so, hopefully, we will have a few more people from CCWT making the journey with me. You would not regret it and we would have an enjoyable time.

It's that time of year when Mother Nature wakes up and revitalises all of creation.


