
Minutes:

A HUGE THANK YOU FROM QUAAMA/COBARGO

There were smiles, tears and hugs all round at the Quaama Hall on Monday afternoon when a ute and trailer load of much needed tools arrived from the Central Coast for our fire ravaged community. So many in this farming area have lost not only their homes, but their sheds containing all the equipment and tools needed for earning an income and for everyday life on the farm.



The following morning two utes towing trailers arrived with animal feed donated by the Central Coast Woodturning Group at Wyong. This feed was bought locally at the Cobargo Produce Store, which benefitted not only the residents but a local business too. There were more cheers, smiles, tears and hugs. Everything was gone in two hours, both tools and feed.





Many many thanks to Mark and the Central Coast Woodturning Group for organizing these generous donations for this very grateful community. Without these donations, especially tools and feed for the animals, many folk would simply walk away from the devastation which is their lives at present.

We would also like to thank the following people for their kindness and for working so hard sourcing and collecting tools: Narelle and Rob Fuller, the Mens Sheds at Elermore Vale and Belmont, Scott Hutchins of Hutchins Building, North Gosford Rotary Club and Glengara Retirement Village.

Quaama is a small village in a farming area 10 kms south of Cobargo, and 30 kms north of Bega.

The Village has only 25 houses standing since the fires and many of these are damaged. There is a community hall, a store and post office, a school and a RFS shed. The Church was also destroyed. Another 60 plus homes and sheds were destroyed on the surrounding farms. These farms are mainly dairy and beef cattle, plus horses, alpacas, sheep and poultry. The loss of livestock, fencing, vehicles, equipment, chook sheds, vegetable gardens, and old trees and gardens has been huge. Everything has changed.

After the fires the Hall was swiftly turned into a Bushfire Relief Centre, enabling the community to have access to food, water, clothing, bedding and some services. All communications were down. No phones, no internet, no power. The hall was a meeting place not only for obtaining necessities, but more importantly it was a place for the traumatized locals to come together and to support each other.

The residents of Quaama and Cobargo are an amazing group of people. They all have their stories to tell and are still coming to terms with their losses. Some people are living in tents, cars and makeshift accommodation. Some have no power and no running water. Others have found accommodation with friends and others have left the area. Most will rebuild but some will not.

The owners of the Quaama Store have started "Caravans 4 Fires". Caravans and camper trailers are being donated or loaned from far and wide so that the locals have somewhere to call home until they can rebuild. This is a great scheme but more donations are needed.

Once again, our thanks and gratitude for everything you have all done for this small community.




"There is this moment when people see a well constructed miniature: a surprised drawing-in of breath, a disbelief that something so small could look so real. This is what I chase.
