Scrollers: No active scrollers at the moment.

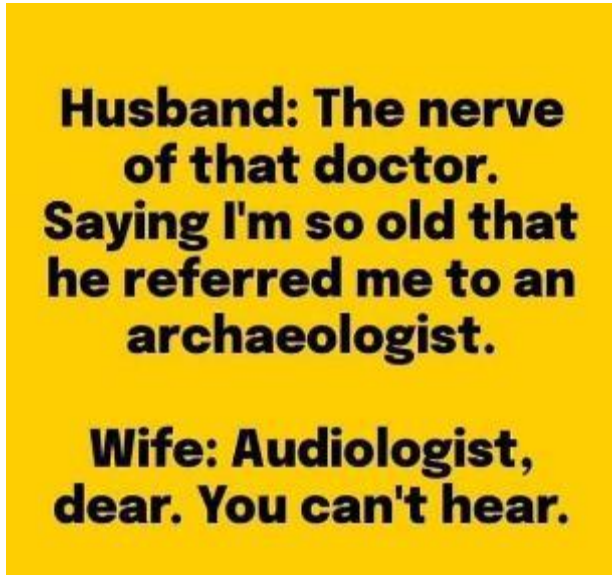
Toys: See correspondence.

Skeeta's memorial service... 16-07-25

It was wonderful to see such a great turn-out of members for the Memorial Service for our extraordinary friend, Brian "Skeeta" Wilson.

We must thank his family, Jason, Katrina and Shelly, for giving us this opportunity to say goodbye to this remarkable man.

I feel very privileged and grateful that I was given the opportunity to speak about Skeeta on behalf of the Club and at a personal level.

The following is what I said:

"I am honoured to have the opportunity to speak about my wonderful mate, Skeeta, today.



I have had the great pleasure of knowing Skeeta since 2006 when John Lea and I first joined the Woodturners. During the years, we became very close friends and he was always a welcome guest in our home. He joined us for many Christmases and family celebrations like birthdays and anniversaries. He realistically became a very welcome part of our extended family.



My kids and grandkids always enjoyed having him around. He was a bit like a kind, eccentric uncle who comes to visit. Everyone loved him and listened intently to his stories.

As we all know, Skeeta loved a chat. We would have regular phone conversations... sometimes 2 or 3 a week... and when Skeeta rang, you knew that you were going to be there for a while. It was good though and, although some 'chats' often went for a couple of hours or more, I do miss them.

I remember once, that Skeeta rang me at about 10 in the morning, and said that he'd just got off the phone to his good friend, Patricia, who lives at Pumpenbil, up near the Qld border. I said that he must have gotten up early but he said that the conversation with Patricia had

started at 5pm the afternoon before. He had been on the phone with her for 14 and a half hours.

Now, Skeeta was always a very reliable and self-motivated gentleman whose honesty, integrity and work ethics have served him well. He was a devoted family man and a great friend to all of those lucky enough to know him well.

He was compassionate for those in need within the community and through the CCWT he worked tirelessly to share his skills and abilities with a wide array of deserving individuals and community groups.

Skeeta has been a member of the Woodturners for nearly 40 years and through his dedication and input he has helped to make the Club the ongoing success that it is today.



During his time with the Club, Skeeta held the positions of President, Board Member, Catering Officer, Sales Co-ordinator, Safety Officer, First Aid Officer, Head Trainer and Grants Officer.

He was an outstanding teacher with an amazing knowledge of his craft and he loved to be able to pass on his skills to the next generation. He was always one of the first to put his hand up when we had school kids or community groups visiting for lessons.

He absolutely loved doing spindle work on the lathe. He thought that anyone could turn a bowl, but spindle work required real skill and finesse. Some of his wooden finials can be seen gracing houses, churches and community halls around the coast.

Skeeta was always very keen to get out into the wider community to promote our club and to demonstrate his wood turning skills. He was instrumental in helping to organise displays at the Working with Wood Show in Sydney; local fetes and fairs and Craft Fairs held at the workshop.

He was also a keynote speaker at several church and community groups, where he has spoken about the history of our club and the importance of keeping our seniors active within the community and giving them a sense of purpose and worth.

For many years Skeeta was an avid participant in all of our community service work, particularly our Christmas Lolly Bowl Drive and our Christmas Toy Drive.

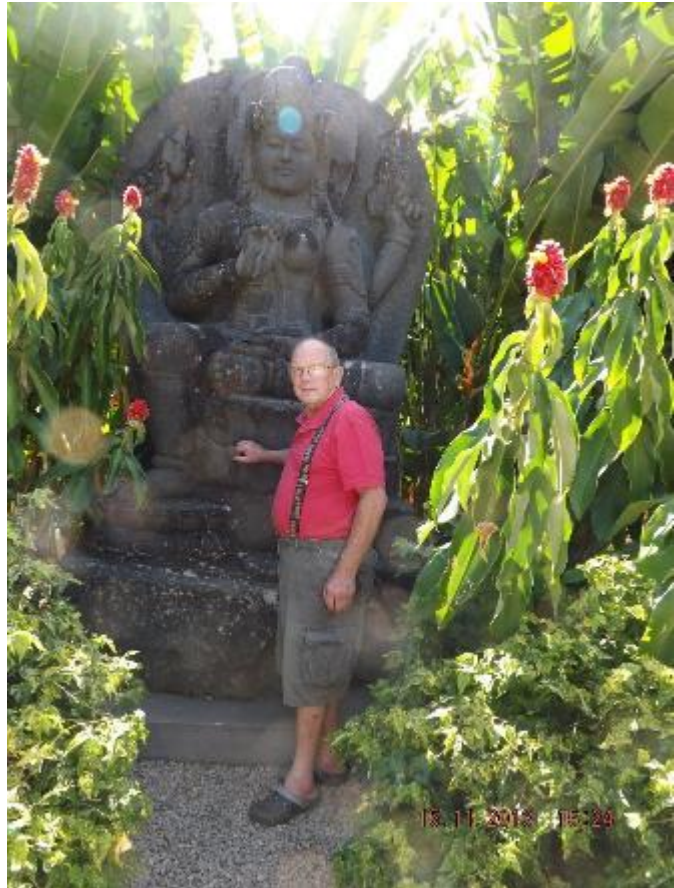
Skeeta was one of those people that every organisation needs. He didn't make a big fuss... didn't expect huge accolades... he just got in and got the job done.

Through illness and misfortune Skeeta did not always have an easy life but he found a haven within our club, where his dedication and friendly, compassionate nature have made him a wonderful friend and a valuable asset for our club.

Skeeta was always learning. He was an avid reader and scholar, and could speak well on nearly any topic. His knowledge of everything related to wood was astounding.

They say that when a wise man dies, we lose a library, and that is very true in this case.

It was recently said at the workshop that “Every club needs a Skeeta” and we are very proud that we had Skeeta as part of our group. He was an outstanding gentleman with well-defined morals and a great sense of purpose. He was passionate about his



craft and our club, and his motivation and expertise have gone a long way to make our club a great success. He was a very rare breed... a kind, compassionate, unique gentleman who loved the world, and the world loved him.

He will be sadly missed but he would not want us to grieve for too long. So, remember our wonderful friend kindly and share your Skeeta stories with others. Allow Skeeta to be your inspiration to show kindness and compassion wherever it is needed in your world.

My sympathy and thoughts are with his family and all of his club mates who got to know this unique man so well over the years.

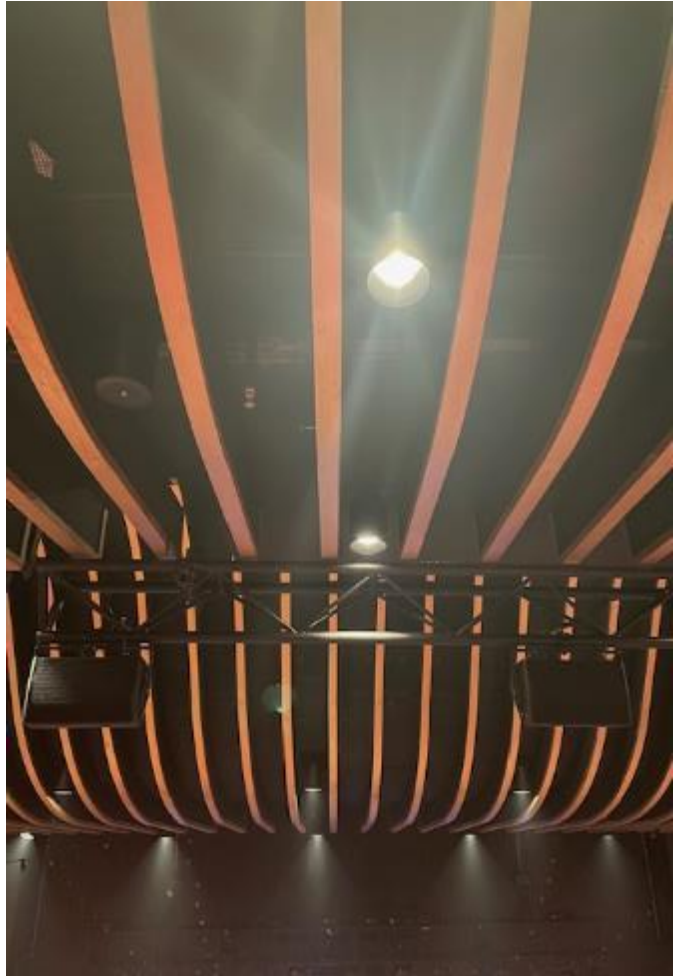

Toy Fund:

I have been asked to try and clear up any confusion regarding the future allocation of money to the Toy Fund.

There are very good reasons why some necessary changes have been made.

Firstly, the money already in the Toy Fund will definitely stay in the Toy Fund to provide support for kids who need our help.

This money was collected from members for the disadvantaged kids in our area, and to do anything else with it would not be right.

As you are all aware, our Club is looking to secure a more permanent place to call home but to do this we need to apply for grants.

One of the first questions that they ask when applying is “What has the Club done to raise money for your project?”

Now, we have been raising money through Bunnings BBQ’s and sales of donated articles, but we need to show that we have done everything possible to achieve our goals.

As a result, after several discussions with Rooster, the Board has decided that money made from future raffles and wood sales will go into our General Fund and not the Toy Fund.

However, this does **not** mean that we value the Toy Fund any less and it does **not** mean that the Toy Fund is being phased out... quite the contrary.

In our constitution it clearly states that: [“An amount not exceeding 20% percent of the surplus may be applied to any charitable purpose, or for promoting co-operation or any community advancement object.”](#)

So, if the Toy Fund needs topping up from time to time, or if a special project relating to kids arises, then of course, money from the General Fund can be used for that.

Obviously, any private monetary donations made specifically for the Toy Fund can only be used for that purpose.

Rooster is happy with this arrangement and to further show everyone’s support of the Toy Fund, a large box has been placed near the front door for your donations of good quality toys. If you can, please wrap them with a tag saying either boy or girl, and the appropriate age group. Please **do not** bring toys that need batteries as these create an unnecessary expense for parents who are already struggling.

We can all add to this by making wonderful wooden toys at home, or at the workshop, and donating them for this incredibly worthy cause.

For any of our newer members, or our older members who have forgotten, the Toy Fund has supported many 1000’s of kids over the years through donations of toys and gift cards at Christmas to women’s refuges on the Coast; also, we supported kids in fire and flood ravaged areas and when the horrible bush fires wiped out much of the South Coast we even arranged to send a busload of traumatised kids on a holiday to the seaside.

I must add that without Rooster working so tirelessly to pick our pockets and engage our support that none of this would have been possible. I commend him for his enthusiasm and look forward to seeing masses of toys in the toy box at the Club.

This is a wonderful opportunity for **all** Club members, and friends of the Club, to do something really special for the kids... Alan.

Timber Slabs:

We are often asked for wood when we are at the workshop. This is despite all the wood stored at the workshop and at Alan Smith's. What people want is dry wood, prepared for immediate use on the lathe. There is some such wood available, at a reasonable cost, to raise funds for the Club.

As well as turning, many of our members also have other woodworking projects. Well, we have a new opportunity available. Recently I was offered some slabs for the Club. On inspection it was found that these slabs were left by a deceased woodworker who had cut and stored these slabs, under cover, and they were completely dry and ready for use. The photos will show some of the slabs and members collecting them last Thursday.

These slabs are now at the workshop. It is hard to show the dimensions of these slabs. They have all been moved to the workshop and are stored in part of our newly created wood store. They vary in length from about 1.8m to 2m+. Width is also variable from 300mm to 450mm+. Thickness is between 30mm 75mm.

If you are considering a project requiring longer lengths of wood then please come to the workshop and look at what we have available. If there is something suitable tell a member of the board and we can discuss prices. We will wait for two weeks before cutting the slabs into more desirable lengths. I know there are some members who are against cutting but they were donated to the club and as such will be sold to club members in required lengths.

Once again thanks must go to the members (Mark, Dom, Keith and Bernie) who gave their time to collect this wood... Peter

Congratulations must go to Rooster and his small band of Christmas elves, for making it such a wonderful event.

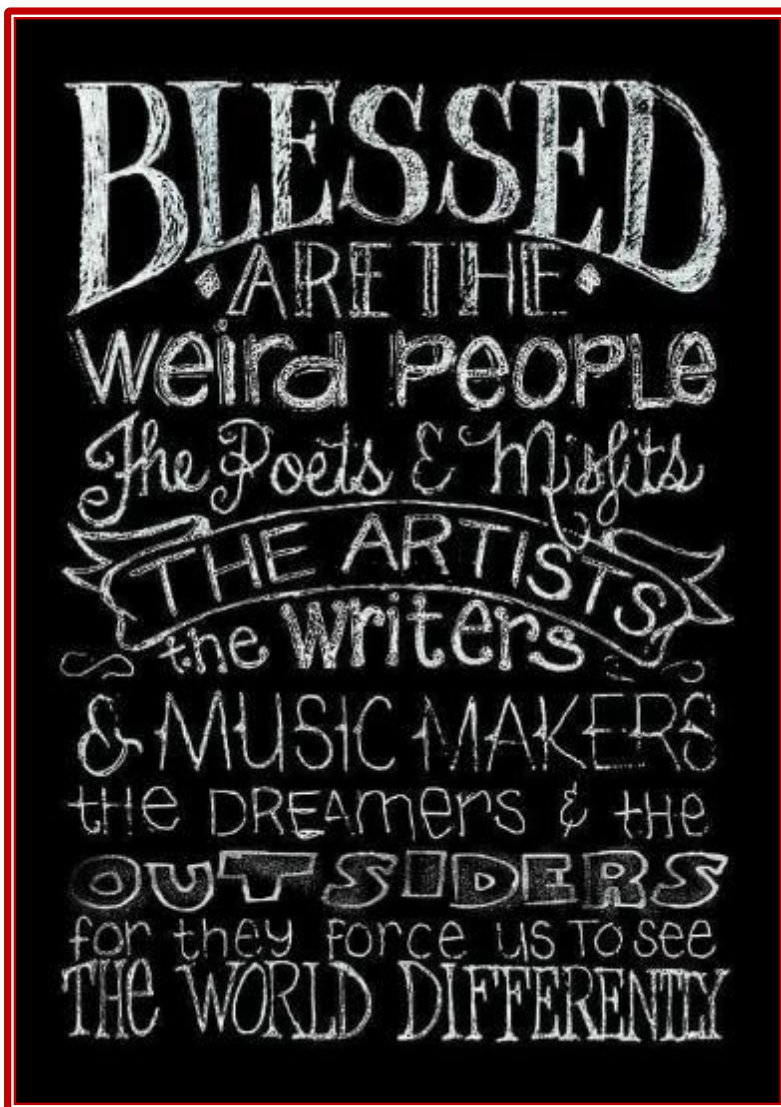
