

I was born on a farm near Victoria Falls the same year as the Sydney Harbour Bridge was opened. Family went "home" to England by boat in 1939 to see the Grand Parents. The war started and they could not return. My father joined up and went to France. He was evacuated from Dunkirk then finished up in North Africa and Italy.

After the war the family returned to South Africa and I remained in England to complete my schooling. After high school I joined my family in Africa but was not happy. I managed to get a boat passage to Australia for 50 pounds.

When I arrived in Australia I got a job with GRAZCOS – shearing contractors. My first job was at DUNGALERAR STATION out of Walgett. That was in June and I was with the same gang for the rest of the

year.

I travelled with Dudley Knipe, one of the shearers, in his Model A Ford. I saw a lot of NSW at a slow pace - and loved it.

After a few years I progressed into Head Office for four years and then went to Bourke as Western District's manager to arrange the shearings. That is when the true country style really sunk in. It is a wonderful part of the state. The people are different and very hospitable. One client, "Babe", aged 60+ - when I called, I would have to go straight to the fridge and get a couple of bottles of beer and we would have a drink. On another occasion I was desperate for a cook and my man was working for the opposition. I phoned his wife and told her the money I was offering. She said, "Eric will be at the Engonia pub until 8.00pm". I bought a pick handle and went to the pub. He was there and I had no trouble. We travelled all night and were in Hungerford by 4.00am. We got the stove going. Cut up chops and had breakfast ready for the 25 men in the mess by 6.30am. I sent a shearer out to a shed past White Cliffs. When the owner tried to put the sheep in the shed on the Sunday night, they wouldn't go in, so he went to see why. There was my shearer, hanging from the rafters, stone dead!

There are always interesting things and people to meet out west. We should all get out there and see the real Australia and not just this coastal strip – which can be seen anywhere in the world! Sea is sea everywhere!



The Harvest Festival was a great success again this year and we must thank the hardy members who organised and attended the event. The weather was fine but cold and those attending had to rug up for the day. The festival was very well attended and sales were good.

Our work is always well received by the community and many folks travel a long way to visit our stalls.

No!!.. Okay, I was just wondering, because I didn't get one either.


Guilio came; he saw and he conquered... again:
