Minutes: It was moved by Bill Allen and seconded by Allan (Cedar) Smith that the minutes of the monthly meeting held in May 2021be accepted. Passed.

Business Arising:

Reports:

Workshop:

John Lea – Members who use the workshop and fail to clean and tidy the area, and the equipment used, remains an issue. Cleaning up is NOT the responsibility of the workshop managers – as some members seem to think! To help address this problem, yellow warning cards will be issued to members not meeting their obligations – possibly leading to a fine if the warnings are not heeded. Any fines will be used to fund replacement band-saw blades. Some items of equipment go missing on a regular basis which is a concern.

Chucks especially need to be cleaned and lubricated regularly. Chucks borrowed from the cupboard must be returned once cleaned and lubricated and borrowers must ensure that ALL components are in the box.

Carvers/Pyrography:

Sue reported that the carvers are going well and almost back to normal. Four members are doing Pyrography.

Scrollers:

Valda reported that two new members have expressed interest in learning scroll-saw skills. New trainers for this discipline are needed.

Toys:

"Rooster" reported that the Toy Fund is quite healthy financially. He is having trouble finding a Women's Refuge on the coast for the Club to support as the previous organisations, including Central Coast Outreach, that the Club was supporting, are no longer operating. Ron Gibbs suggested a special Government school for youth in Years 9 -11 who are experiencing difficulty in mainstream education as a worthy recipient of the Club's support. There was general agreement for "Rooster" and Ron to investigate the Club providing further support.



Several members are investigating other organisations that meet the Club criteria for support.

Library:

Members – especially new members - are encouraged to make use of this Club facility. Please use the card system and return the books at the end of each month. Numerous woodworking magazines have been donated to the Club. Members are encouraged to take these and return them when finished.

Hobby Turner:

Alan Smith is in the process of preparing the next Hobby Turner. He would love some contributions for the newsletter from members. Please send Alan any material that may be suitable.

Merchandise:

There are lots of items for sale in our shop. See Skeeta or Phil for details.

The shop is being re-organised to meet the changing needs of members.

There is a good supply of super glue.

Stylewood is not available to conform with Government regulations. Members need to organize their own supplies.

General Business:

- 1. Members are encouraged to discuss with their G.P. to get Shingles injections.
- 2. Valda informed the meeting that cabinet sales are going well. She will organize a changeover of items in November.
- 3. Members are encouraged to make lolly bowls in time for distribution at Christmas.

- 4. Barry Peick informed members that light duty plastic bags will be banned as of 1st June. Meeting agreed for Barry to purchase a box of heavy-duty plastic bags which comply with the new regulations for use at sales events.
- 5. "Rooster" informed the meeting that the barbecues need replacing. Moved Sue, seconded Ron "That "Rooster" arranges for the purchase of a barbecue." Carried. Mark Board will arrange the disposal of the old barbecues.
- 6. "Skeeta" reminded members that subs are due.
- 7. Barry Peick will collect gear needed for sales next Friday.
- 8. Bill Allen has been in touch with management at Erina Fair to investigate organizing Club sales there – possibly in September. He asked for members interested in participating and this request will be made to all members through the Hobby Turner. Bill has offered to organize this sale if it is supported by sufficient members.
- 9. Sue Wood expressed concern about some of the materials stored in the Carving room. Board members will look at re-locating some of this gear. Alan Smith has offered to store the lolly bowls at his place.
- 10. Alan Smith informed members that a good variety of wood is stored at his place and available for purchase by members.
- 11. Peter Kun expressed concern that his sales sheets from the Craft Extravaganza have not been returned to him. He inquired about a financial report for the event and was informed that Garry presented it to the Board immediately after the event. The secretary can provide the sales figures if Peter needs them. He also indicated that he was not happy with the overall organization of the event.

Peter informed the meeting that he is ceasing woodworking and that he has a wide range of tools and equipment for sale. President Peter suggested that Peter make a list of the things he has for sale, along with prices, and give them to Alan for inclusion in the Hobby Turner.

Next monthly meeting will be on Saturday2nd July. (As long as "Murphy" doesn't interfere!)




A man was arrested in Melbourne recently for supposedly running a scam where he was selling water taken from "The Fountain of Youth".

Good news, we are getting new members starting in the different crafts offered at CCWT.


Bad news, we need more past members to renew their membership.





Trying something new...

As many of you know, I also dabble in a bit of watercolour painting.

Well, one day my art teacher, Belinda, asked if I knew anyone in our club who would take on a commission to make her a large, round picture frame for one of her works. It had to have an outside diameter of around 800mm and be made from a darker timber.

Now, Belinda is a world-renowned artist who specialises in botanical and true to life paintings. A second-rate frame would not do justice to her amazing artworks.

I told her that I was sure that I could find someone to do it for her but I added that if I couldn't, then I would have a go at it myself. I also pointed out that I had never done anything like this before.

Anyway, the end result was that I now had a picture frame to make.

I happened to have a couple of nice, well-seasoned branches of an Australian Red Cedar tree that I'd acquired from another member, Allan 'Cedar' Smith, in the Dooralong valley. I decided to slab one of the logs to see what it looked like, and it was beautiful.

Making a pattern was no problem but working out how to make the frame strong and rigid, and then deciding how to turn it, was a bit challenging.

Obviously, the frame needed to be segmented, so I decided on 6 pieces and made a template out of cardboard.

I used dowel joints to join the pieces, along with epoxy glue. This made for very strong joints and I was happy with the results.

Now came the task of mounting the frame for turning.



I used 2 layers of thick ply that were glued and screwed for rigidity and attached the frame using hot glue and specially made brackets (see photo). It was nothing fancy but it worked.

My idea was to initially turn the recess on the back of the frame and inlay a large circle of ply, held in place with hot glue. I could then screw through the ply, into the backing plate, and make it secure.

This allowed me to remove the custom clamps and finish the back of the frame.



I decided to French polish the frame to give the finishing polyurethane lacquer something to bond to. I was going to be using a matt finish as requested by Belinda.

This all went well until I tried to decorate the back of the frame with beads and knurling. I had it looking lovely and decided to just touch up a bead with a new tool that I hadn't used before... and Yes! you guessed it, it dug in and ran right across everything.

Luckily, I had made the timber pieces thick enough to allow for stupid mistakes, so I took some 20-grit garnet paper and sanded off all of the beads and knurling.

Anyway, the back eventually turned out well. I stained it with Black Japan but left a timber highlight around the edge.

I drilled a 7mm hole in the centre of the plywood insert and the backing plate, to allow for easy centring of the job when reversed. I then removed the job from the backing plate, glued a 7mm dowel onto the

backing plate and, after the glue had dried, I easily remounted the job using lots of screws.

Turning the front of the frame was easy because Belinda just wanted it plain.



It was difficult to remove the hot glue from the inlaid circle of ply but I remembered what Skeeta had told me and I doused it liberally with Mineral Turps and the glue just peeled right off.



After French polishing and lacquering it was finished and ready for delivery.

Belinda was thrilled with the result.

I was hoping to show the finished, framed picture here but that will have to wait for the next edition because after Belinda delivered the painting and the frame to the framer, they (the framers) all came down with Covid and temporarily closed down.

I can tell you though that the painting is of a beautiful Australian parrot sitting on an Australian Red Cedar branch and that the branch came from a tree in my back paddock.


Featured Artisan: Skeeta's been busy...

It's the time of year when we should be checking on our family, neighbours and friends again and again to make sure that they are all OK. Help out when and where you can and get extra help if it's needed.


If you are doing it tough yourself, then please reach out to somebody.
