
PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

In the last couple of weeks, I have attended two memorial ceremonies for partners of two of our members. This brings home the importance of keeping our priorities clear. Family and health must be top of our list with hobbies and volunteer work further down. Sometimes we get carried away, taking for granted things that are close, and not noticing the contribution others around us are making.



Time is passing all of us by. Already we have been at the Guides Hall for six months. Things are settling down but

we are still tinkering with the set up at the workshop. The biggest problem is storage. Thigs are put away in one place and after use some one puts them in a different place. This results in time wasted for those looking after the workshop session as they search for misplaced items.



The one of the greatest dangers at the workshop is dust. We recently were able to put a large amount of camphor laurel, still very wet, into a make shift storage at the workshop. Some of us have been turning this wood green, roughly shaping the wood before sealing the end grain and putting the blank away to dry further. It was mentioned to me that perhaps the dust from camphor laurel could be dangerous to health. I have not researched this but dust, from any wood, will always be a health hazard. Despite the two extractor fans at the workshop, we do get a buildup of dust. To this end, at a recent board meeting, it was agreed that once a month we would call an early end to the workshop session and spend the last 45 minutes or so with everybody present cleaning the workshop. It is not just the floor around your lathe that needs attention but the whole workshop space. We had our first clean up this Friday and the workshop did look tidy for our board meeting. Next time we need to start higher up as dust accumulates on shelves, window sills etc.

As we move into July you are reminded that annual fees are due. This year the annual subscription is \$60. As well as members paying promptly, we are constantly looking for new members. So far, we have a few new members since opening again. The numbers using the workshop are gradually increasing. Saturdays have been the slowest but this Saturday bucked the trend with a good turnout of people turning. It is cheering for those of us who spent so much time getting a new workshop to see all the lathes busy and 'lively' conversation at morning tea.

One word of warning to members who are considering returning to the workshop is the current cold snap. On Friday the temperature when I arrived at the workshop was four degrees. This was beaten on Saturday when it was three degrees. Make sure you are well rugged up and a pair of light gloves or mittens would not go amiss.

July means it is very nearly time for our AGM, Saturday 7th September. We will need to have serious discussions about the direction the club intends to go in relation to long term occupation of workshop space. I have been president now for nearly six years. In that time, we have dealt with a pandemic. We have had to leave our workshop and find new premises.

In summary I shall not be standing for the position of president at the next AGM.

In the mean time we have our next monthly Club meeting on July 6th in the workshop starting at 1.00 pm. This means we will have our normal workshop in the morning and reintroduce our sausage sizzle at 12.30pm. Please bring your own chair, just in case we have a turn out larger than the number of chairs in the workshop.






