PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

Greetings everyone.

MOVING FORWARD

You will have heard about our short- and longer-term necessities, not the least of which is having somewhere to operate beyond the current term of this lease, which in reality is quite short.

There are a number of ways this may be addressed, and some are under constructive consideration, however, there is a need for patience and a structured approach.

We will only exist in the future, with suitable tenure, through the injection of funding from grants – pure and simple – there is no other way to source funding. The roadway to that is to firstly become a charitable organisation that can apply for and accept grants. This is underway but we must first put our house in order and that includes being able to supply a full twelve months of accurate accounting records. That will be accomplished by 30th September under the expert guidance of Chris Strong, who has done a great job in getting us this far. After that we can apply for the appropriate classification and charitable status through the Australian Charities and Not-For-Profit Commission (ACNC), and as a Deductible Gift Recipient (DGR) through the Australian Tax Office.

Meanwhile, we will continue to explore all options for accommodation and tenure.

New Roof:

The development of the site at the Guide Hall continues. Having had to put up a new roof covering on the existing container, when we arrived at the Guide Hall, it was decided to do the same for the second container. We now have a fine new structure spanning the gap between the two containers. As usual with such projects it was not a simple matter but our intrepid builders were able to overcome all difficulties.



All such projects come at a cost to the club but, expenditure such as this, is always kept to the minimum. Timber and other necessary parts were purchased and during the recent period of fine weather all the work was completed. We now want to enclose one end of the open space between the containers and thus create an extended area for storing and possibly processing wood gathered for club members to use. Currently there is a lot of timber stacked in the open.



Unfortunately, this timber cracks and soon becomes unusable, except for firewood. It is hoped to have some working bees to collect, cut and stack this wood under cover. I say collect as there is still wood at Alan Smith's property.

We have two shelving units in the second container, but in a new development, a large amount of sturdy shelving was fetched and unloaded this morning. I am sure

there will be a lot more information on this at the next Club meeting. It will be worth attending in order to see what has been done, and achieved by, a few volunteer Club members... Peter

Scouts:

A few weeks ago, the Scout's leader asked the President if we could do something with a group of scouts as part of their project on 'wood'. This provided us with the excellent opportunity to interact with our nearest neighbour. It was agreed we would host a troop of 11-14 year olds. This was passed to me and I organised for the young people to turn a pen.



The whole group arrived, all 18 of them, including one poor lad who had only joined that evening. The group was almost equal number of boys and girls. After a quick safety talk, they split up into three groups. A number of members gave up their evening so that we were able to provide an experienced turner as one on one for the scouts.

The evening progressed almost as planned. The plan was to complete one group before sending for the next group. This was soon replaced by sending individuals back to the scout hut and replacing them with another youngster. There was one of the scout leaders present all the evening and quite a number of parents as well as our members. By the end of the evening every scout had produced a 7mm broad pen.



Obviously, they could not do all the drilling and gluing in one evening so I had gathered enough equipment to set up seven lathes with the necessary bushings. I also preprepared enough blanks with tubes glued in, plus spares in case of mistakes.

At the end of the evening all the members taking part agreed that it had been a satisfactory evening.

The attention of the scouts at the start of the evening, the level of concentration while they were turning, and the look on their face when they held up their finished pen, made the whole evening a great success.

Many of the parents showed great interest in what we did at the club. Some took home details of membership. One dad even asked to make his own pen. As the scouts had all completed the task, he felt it must be easy. He was astonished at the level of skill needed as he completed the turning and assembly.

Hopefully, we have planted the seed of an idea, which might result in some of the participants to remember turning when they are older and better placed to return to the hobby. Perhaps we might even get one or two of their parents to come and join us.

My thanks, and those of the Scouts, go to the seven members who helped on the evening. It was not the warmest of nights and standing beside a lathe watching and teaching did little to keep them warm... Peter

is needed. I have great admiration for the new friend that I made that day.

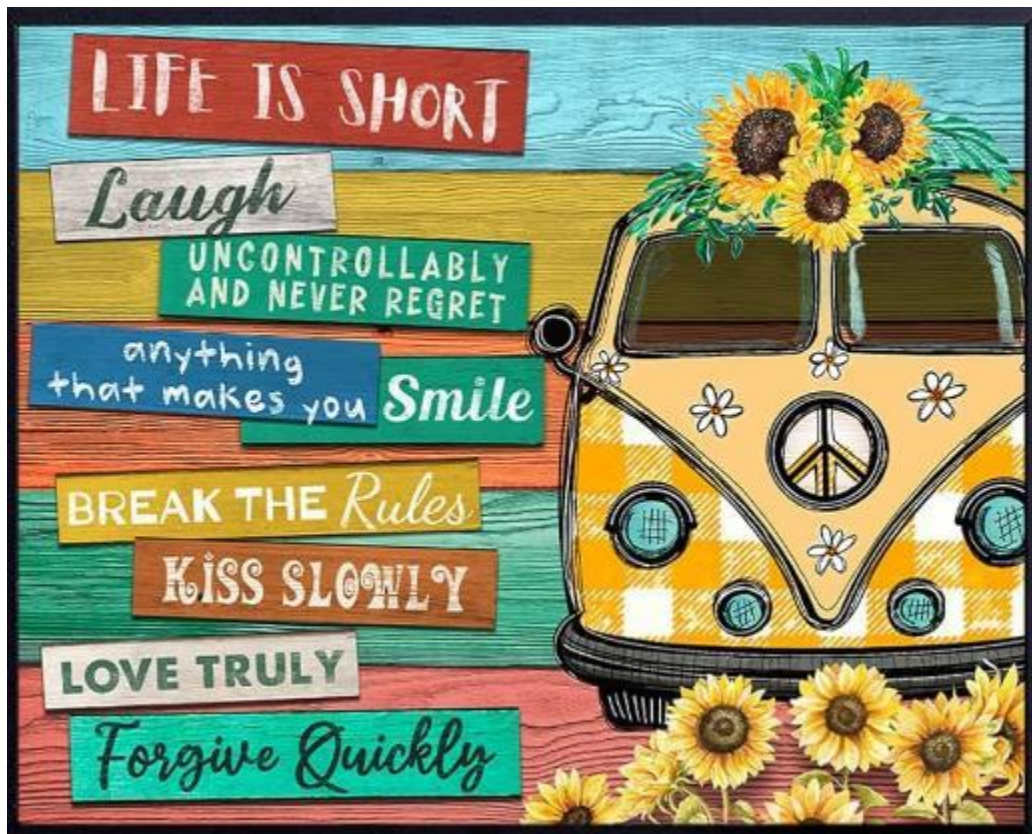
I have had this exact same scenario happen twice now in the last 12 months.
