

PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

Yet again my deadline for reporting falls between two big events. Firstly, our new premises for a workshop opened on Monday 4th March. This was the culmination of hours and hours work by a large group of members, but more of that later. The second event is the official opening of the workshop to be held next week on March 21st at 10.00am.

We are now officially up and running again. The Ourimbah Guide Hall does not provide everything we were looking for in our new workshop. It does however, go a





We reached this solution to our problem after a long and protracted period of negotiations between the Council, The Alison Homestead and the Guides. The lease on the Guide Hall is for five years. There is no automatic option of an extension written into the lease. It is too soon after completing what we have achieved so far to talk about the future but we are still in discussion with the council and the Homestead

Museum. Whilst not in the front of our thoughts at the moment the Council is aware that we are still looking for a long-term solution to our situation.

It has not been cheap arranging our move into the Guide Hall. Luckily existing funds, plus donations, mean we have been able to meet all our running costs, plus the costs associated with moving our equipment. Going forward we are confident that we can meet our day-to-day running costs providing the workshop is used. The Guide Hall is ours 24/7 so there is no reason why we can't use it at any time. At the moment we will continue with our opening mornings on Monday, Friday and Saturday. Are these the best times to open? Our income depends on use so I am open to suggestions that would maximise our use. If you have a preference for a different time, perhaps an afternoon or evening, please email me with your suggestions. I make no promises that we will meet all the requests, but the more we use the workshop the more secure the immediate future for the club.

As I said, the opening of the workshop is a result of the dedicated work of a several Board members, plus the combined effort of members, when requested to volunteer their time. Requests for working bees resulted in a good number of members allowing us to complete the transfer of equipment from the Containers at Alan Smith's property to the Guide Hall. Smaller dedicated working bees completed the fit out at the hall and here we are with a new home. On behalf of the board and all members I must thank everybody who gave their time and effort, in any way, to achieve this outcome. It also remains once again to thank Alan Smith for giving permission to place two containers on his property. As well as this Alan purchased one of the containers and, subsequentially, has purchased the second container.

On March 21st at 10.00am we will hold the official opening. A number of people have been invited but unfortunately all the local politicians have had to decline, claiming parliamentary duties as their reason. On the other hand, we still have a number of our benefactors accepting. It has also been pleasing to see some long-term members able to attend. There will be a short speech from myself, thanking those people who have made this possible followed by a couple of presentations. Visitors will be able to 'tour' the workshop while



enjoying a 'morning tea'. I look forward to reporting back on this event at the club meeting on April 6th, as well as the next HT.

This is the next exciting chapter in CCWT's history. It is up to us all to make this a successful move. The work required to adapt the Hall to our needs has resulted in a smart, tidy and clean workshop. Things will not necessarily be where members might expect but it is important that we run with what we have.

Only after a short period using the workshop, can we see if things need to change. The important issue is that we keep the workshop the way we have it. If you have thoughts on how

to improve things, please keep then to yourself at the moment. Those people who gave their time setting up the workshop are exhausted. The last thing they need at the moment is to be bombarded with ideas for improvement. After a reasonable time of running the workshop as it is, we will review arrangements, and that will be the time to put forward your suggestions.

In the meantime, let's enjoy our new workshop and work to get the Club back on a secure footing.

Janine Gibbs represented The Elderslee Foundation who had provided grants previously, enabling us to purchase new equipment.

which she had painted with a rustic scene
and the club logo. She was joined by
Richard Alexander who also presented a
double-handed saw. This is as yet unpainted.









Finally, we were able to present Sohail Mohideen with a bowl, turned by Ron Gibbs, from a burl presented to the Club for this purpose. Unfortunately, Sohail was not able to get to the event in time for this, so the bowl was presented to his wife, Linda. Sohail was able to join us later in the event

Following the opening, guests and members were able to enjoy morning tea. Bernard Careil and his helpers prepared cakes and sandwiches. Thanks to all those who helped out. It was an excellent day.

On a final note, I was going to say the only thing missing from the workshop is <u>YOU</u>, but after this morning, Monday 25th, I don't know. This morning the workshop was nearly full. Well, all the lathes, bar one, were being used. We had four carvers present, which included a new member. Other members were present for meetings, or to help sort out equipment.



- 4. Welcome members. We have over 30 of our members here today. Hopefully as we get under way again numbers using the workshop will swell. Plus, please put the word out that we are welcoming new members. In fact, as a result of our BBQ last



Saturday at Bunnings we recruited a new member for carving. Good news, as now hopefully Sue won't be sitting on her own in the carver's area.

5. Short history why we ended up here.

- Used to be at Kariong, but for the last 16 years we were at the Old Milk Factory in Wyong.
- CCWT moved to The Milk Factory in answer to an advert asking for community groups. An agreement was reached and the new workshop was set up. There was an agreement in place, but failure to update this lease left us in a very vulnerable position.
- Covid prior to Covid we had over 100 members. Covid, with the associated restrictions caused by 'keep your distance' reduced us to just five lathes at times. We were also locked down completely for some of the time. We weathered the storm only to then face an even greater challenge.
- Owing to the appointment of a new site manager our rent was increased way



beyond anything we could afford. We were forced to move out during November 2022 and placed all our equipment in two containers on Alan Smith's property. Not only did Alan give us permission to place two containers on his land but he also paid for one of them. By the way, now that we have moved out Alan has purchased the second container from us.

• So, our search began. Dreams of a new super-sized workshop built to our own specification were soon dashed. We looked at halls, derelict buildings, schools that had been empty for over a decade, but all to no avail, until, on my way home from a Club meeting, in the car park of Heatherbrae, my phone went. It was Robert Zwart, a member, who recounted a conversation he had just had with a lady from the Guides. She had told him there was an empty Guide Hall at Ourimbah. Being a few hundred metres from said hall, I immediately drove round here. There were definite possibilities so we arranged a meeting. The lady was Elizabeth, and at last we left a meeting with a smile on our faces.

- In the meantime, the Council had granted us outline permission to build a workshop at the Alison Homestead. The Museum was also in agreement and so started a parallel set of negotiations. The advantage of the Museum was we would only have to pay a small rent and we would build what we wanted! Or so we thought! Mark Board, our vice president has put hours and hours of work in following this up. He has prepared several pre-DA submissions to Council and every time they are knocked back, 'Can't Build it there it's too big it's with wrong colour it can still be seen from the museum (if you lean out far enough on the veranda) you can't cut down trees as they are all heritage –etc. etc. We are just about at the end of dealings with the Council.
- Back to the Guide Hall. Things started to move forward and it became a real
 possibility. The Guides were looking to sell the property but would consider a
 lease. Things stalled a little at this stage and we became a little discouraged,
 when along came our own superhero, Sohail Mohideen, a local solicitor and
 neighbour of the afore mentioned Mark Board.
- Sohail generously offered to look over, which soon became much more, the lease on offer. Various negotiations went back and forth, and eventually the deal was signed. We are very grateful to the Guides who throughout the negotiations were mindful of what we could afford by way of rent.
- On January 1st 2024 we became the occupier of Ourimbah Guide Hall for five years.



- We set about adapting the hall to our needs. We strengthen and sound proofed the floor with materials gratefully donated by Walker Brothers.
- Several working bees set up the workshop and we were ready for action. The first workshop session for members was held on Monday 4th March, and after this morning's celebration the CCWT workshop will be fully open.
- Whilst the workshop area for the lathes is larger than our last home the overall space available is not as large. At the Milk Factory we had three spaces, the workshop, the tearoom and the carvers/pyrography space. In the Guide Hall we only have one workshop space, plus some smaller areas such as a kitchen and member's shop.

- Please feel free to tour (if you can call such a space a tour) after the opening of the workshop.
- It has to be stated that we have only arrived at the position we have now, thanks to the considerable amount of work carried out by a few members. Thanks must go to members of the Board who, as well as the usual monthly meetings, were happy to hold extra meetings at short notice. Members of the Board met frequently, often in small sub-committee groups, to address particular difficulties.



- Members always responded to requests for working bees, either whole club requests, or smaller numbers for what I call my muscle group. I don't intend to list all the names but you know who you are and thank you.
- Funds were always a problem. We are a not-for-profit club, so, as such we raise the minimum amount of money in order to run the club. The only fund with any money was the Toy Fund but this money has always been earmarked and secured for the purpose it was raised for, namely young people at Christmas.
- Several members came to our aid with generous donations.
- We also joined the ranks of Bunnings BBQ providers. A stalwart team have now conducted four BBQs and each time raised very necessary funds. Only one BBQ was disappointing, not through bad weather... well, Yes!... bad weather, as the temperature was over 40 degrees that day. Despite soldiering on the public stayed at home in their air conditioning.

6. Future!

- We are only secure for the next five years.
- The lease does not contain an option to extend the lease, nor does the lease give CCWT first option to buy.
- So, there are things to be considered, and soon, as it will be surprising how fast five years will go by.
- It is possible we will need to raise considerable funds in order to secure our future.

- Remember, I referred to members in excess of 100 pre Covid. We enter this new chapter with just under 50 fully paid-up members. I have to temper those figures with the knowledge that we had a number of members who did not maintain their annual fees while the workshop was closed. It is hoped, and indeed is already happening, that these members will renew their membership in the next financial year. Obviously, for insurance purposes, and to be fair to those members who paid their annual membership, we can only allow fully financial members to use the equipment
- But for now, let's enjoy our new workshop and restore CCWT to pre-Covid days.

7. Presentations

One person that I introduced at the beginning, is Jill Lewis. Jill is the wife of Brian and a friend of mine. One day on visiting their home Jill showed me her hobby, painting old saw blades. They acquired the old saws at boot sales and garage sales but shortly after that some saws were brought into our workshop.



- Soon after that Laurie Luthje, a long-term member of the club and the instructor who taught me all he knew about turning pens, was downsizing his workshop and gave me his father's two handled saw. Jill has kindly painted a rustic scene on the saw including the CCWT logo. This I would like to ask Jill if she would like to come forward and present this saw on my behalf to the Club for display in the workshop in memory of past members, in particular Kerry Robinson, a past long time member and instructor of the club. Kerry taught me much about turning and even more about dealing with people and situations, many of them caused by Kerry
- I also have another saw, "in the raw" so to speak. I first caught site of this saw as Richard Alexander was walking towards the Alison Homestead Men's Shed. He was clearing his workshop of unwanted items and intended to give the saw to the Men's Shed. I managed to persuade him, without much difficulty, that it would look good, alongside the saw Jill had painted, in our own workshop. Perhaps Richard would join Jill and present the two saws to Mark Board, vice president of the Club, on behalf of the members of CCWT.

cancel the sale and miss the opportunity to make much needed funds for our club.


