We are steadily increasing our numbers with a few new members joining the club this year. We welcome them


warmly and trust their time in the Club meets their expectations.


We are looking for members to come along on the day to help out.

He wondered if this was the same kind of telephone he saw in Texas and he asked a nearby nun what its purpose was.


She told him that it was a direct line to heaven and that for \$10,000 he could talk to God.
