PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

Well, another month has sped past. Where does the time go? I have barely got used to it being 2024 and we are nearly half way through.

I think everybody is satisfied that the workshop is beginning to function as it should. As I said in my last report all we need now is members to use the facility. The Monday workshop is well attended and Fridays had picked up, though today was a little disappointing. Saturday is the least well attended. If we are to have a workshop it must

be used in order to raise the money needed to meet running costs.



On the subject of money, the Board have agreed to a motion raising the annual fee to \$60. The daily cost for using the workshop remains at \$5. Remember we have a Bunnings BBQ on Saturday June 15th. There is still time to volunteer to help on the day. Even just for few hours will give someone a rest. We will also have another sale of product, so as well as people to help man the stall, we need donations of items to sell on behalf of the club.

Don Crittenden is working hard to get the new shop organised and ready to open. He has already made a few sales but is preparing an order to go to Timberbits. Whilst he will stock up on the usual items, such as glue and sandpaper, he needs to be told if you regularly bought some other item from the shop.

Following on from the motion passed at the last Club meeting, we will hold next Saturday's meeting at the workshop, **not at Alison Homestead.** We will begin the meeting at 10.00 am following our board meeting beginning at 8.30am. Because of the meetings the workshop will be closed on Saturday 1st June. If this meeting is successful, I would like to go back to the arrangements we had at The Milk factory, that is normal workshop until 12.00 mid-day followed by a BBQ and the Club Meeting at 12.30 pm.

The board have agreed to building a small woodstore behind the container at our new premises. We have placed some plastic pallets to keep the wood off the ground. In the first instance we will cover the wood with some iron sheeting left at the site, but in due course we



will construct a roof over it. This is timely as we have received several offers of wood but it is always difficult to recover it. Currently those of us who are members of Erina Men's Shed are busy cutting up some large camphor laurel logs left at the shed. Clearly some of this wood must be left at the Men's Shed for the wood turners there. As camphor goes this has good colour. Hopefully I will have sent some photos to Alan for inclusion in the HT.





The workshop is keeping those Board members not on holiday, very busy. We are still sorting boxes and trays of 'stuff' that we accumulated during our time at the Milk Factory. As well as sorting the 'useful' from the 'old and no longer used' there is much discussion as to where to store these treasures. It is most important if you are in the workshop and use a tool that you put it away in the same place you found it. If you need a tool, please ask one of the Board at the workshop who might be able to save you time looking for it.

We have a special event at the workshop on Monday June 17th. Gosford North Rotary Club (my Rotary Club) will be visiting us in the evening. The workshop will be open for their visit at 6.00 pm., finishing at about 8.00pm. They want to see our new workshop and see the sort of things we make. I will shortly be asking for volunteers to demonstrate some aspect of woodturning, carving and maybe pyrography. After the demonstration we will have a BBQ. Bernard is planning the menu to hopefully include a dessert. At this

point I don't know how many visitors we will have, as this is the meeting before their 'change over dinner' the following Monday.

As we head into winter, I look forward to seeing many of you at our Club meeting at the Ourimbah workshop on Saturday 1st June.



Welcome to the Shop:



We are now up and running at the Ourimbah Guide Hall building. It is good to see the number of members (and new members) who are availing themselves of the lathes and woodworking equipment.

It certainly has been a change moving from our previous premises at the Milk Factory to our new digs at the Guide Hall. As time goes on, there are changes and modifications that have been made and will continue to be made to improve our operations.

In the moving process, many of the resources have been moved and it has been necessary to do some re-

organisation. This has been evident in shop supplies.

Earlier in the year, Phil Clements stepped down from the role of 'shop supervisor' and this has been taken over by Don Crittenden and John Butlin.

New Member's:

There have been several new members welcomed to the club (and hopefully many more). For wood turning in particular, once the skills needed for turning (turning between centres, using tools and gouges, beads and coves, sanding) have been learned it will be important that turners should have a basic set or kit, which will probably comprise some of the following;



Selection from; CA glue 80 grit Thin or 120 grit medium 180 grit 'Super 240 grit Glue' 320 grit



EEE Ultra Shine is a cut and polish wax paste



Shellawax Cream is a friction polish for timber



General purpose food safe paste wax

Projects:

Common projects undertaken include bowls, live edge bowls, platters, lidded boxes, lolly bowls, vases, mugs, segmented bowls, pens, potpourri bowls, chess pieces, honey dippers, spinning tops, salt and pepper grinders, candle holders, bottle stoppers, Christmas trees, tool handles and much more. All of these will use the above items to some degree.

Other Shop Supplies Worth Considering:

At the time of writing for this Hobby Turner, in the workshop store we have some basic supplies for most people. It is necessary to supplement existing stock with new supplies as needed.

Currently we have at least:

i)	Sandpapers ranging from 80 grit up to 400 grit (limited).
ii)	Sandpapers (hook and loop / Velcro type) suitable for attaching to discs
iii)	Variety of pen kits and some refills
iv)	Pen bits and pieces, variety of pen cases
v)	Clock mechanisms, parts, numbers and numerals, faces, some inserts
vi)	Range of Lazy Susan mechanisms (different sizes)
vii)	Patterned circular ceramic inserts for platters
viii)	Some salt and pepper grinder mechanisms, salt and pepper shakers
ix)	Variety of knives (cheese, pate)
x)	Salad servers
xi)	Brass candle holder inserts
xii)	Variety of thermometers from larger to small, perpetual calendars
xiii)	Glass beakers for flower inserts
xiv)	Some PPE including masks and glasses
xv)	Limited 'super glue' and epoxy and 1L Titebond, PVA

If you need a project or supplies for an idea or existing project, come and have a look at what is available.

Out of stock items include the all-important finishes of EEE cream and wax. It is hoped that an excursion to Timberbits in the near future (early June) will see this being available at the club.

Important Note for All:

Central Coast Wood Turners attempts to get materials at the best possible price for all members and items are generally sold at or near cost price. Most retailers will charge for freight and where possible we try to limit this cost.

Barbara was indeed a very special person and all who knew her valued her friendship and the many and varied skills she generously shared.


That she will be greatly missed is a huge understatement. She bravely suffered pain and discomfort for a very long time and that she is now at peace is a small consolation.

I did all of this from my office, sitting in a comfy chair, with hot/cold drinks, a refrigerator and bathroom facilities nearby.


There were no expensive flights, no standing in queues, no crowds and no noise.
