PRESIDENT'S REPORT:

Every time I sit down to write a report to members something changes the next day. I remember from my time as a school principal 'the only thing that is constant is change'. Almost daily the restrictions on what we are allowed to do seems to change.

In reply to one of my letters to members when I said I was totally confused, a member kindly sent me a copy of the NSW restrictions and what would be allowed when the state achieved set targets in relation to the number of people fully vaccinated. The very next day they were changed, then a change of Premier gave us a raft of new restrictions to be eased. Hopefully, the



latest letter sent out, after our recent board meeting, has made things clear in relation to opening the workshop.

The hardest thing in this pandemic is trying to get clarity on exactly what is allowed at the workshop. Clearly it is not a business, but exactly how one defines the CCWT and what restrictions apply has all along been a difficult task for the board. Despite this the board has always been mindful of trying to protect the health of members. At every turn of events the board has tried to keep as much of the workshop open as possible. Being mindful of the average age of members it was difficult to find the balance between keeping as much of the club premises open and protecting vulnerable members.

It will be great to get back to a fully open workshop. Unfortunately, we will still be unable to accommodate learners as adherence to the 1.5 metre distance rule makes it impossible to teach. This will also be made difficult if wearing masks is still compulsory. We also hope to start the course to train more instructors as soon as possible. Because of the constant interruptions to this course Skeeta will be starting at the beginning again.

The board has also set the 1st February 2022 as the AGM. This will also be the first full club meeting since June 2021. It was not possible to hold our AGM in 2020 and members of the



board kindly agreed to continue for another year. We have also had to postpone 2021's AGM resulting in the current board having been in place for some two and a half years. My term as President is now in its fourth year. We will have the opportunity to elect new members to board positions. Several members of the board have been in place for a considerable period of time. While their enthusiasm for the club shows no sign of waning, they would like a rest. Please consider carefully if you could put your name forward for election. The board needs new members and people who represent other aspects of club activities. Although a significant number of our members are ladies, we have no

In unison they said: "Can we see it?" I laughed and said "Gran and I just caught a very bad cold."



LETTERS TO THE EDITOR:

Dear Editor

During the course of the pandemic, I have become aware that some members are disappointed with the response of members to the need for more "sellers". I would like to express my reasons for not responding to the request. Can I make clear that I am writing as an individual, a member of CCWC, not as President of the Club? My thoughts might agree with other members but I have had no discussion with other members on this matter.

Firstly, I did not join CCWC in order to sell what I make. I was once asked "If you are not going to sell, why did you join the club?"

I understand that originally the club responded to opportunities provided in the locality to sell product in order that members could sell surplus items. I know there are a few members who specifically produce objects in order to sell. For me when I finish a piece it is the end of a whole process. This process starts when a group goes out to cut and collect wood. It may continue at Alan's yard as we cut blanks or slab the wood on club equipment. The camaraderie provided at the workshop is part of the process and hopefully it will result in something I can take pride in. I fully understand how quickly shelves and cupboards fill. There are not enough friends and family to give our product to. Eventually it might be a good idea to try and sell but it is never going to be the reason why I turn.

Having toyed with the possibility of selling I am faced with the possible scrutiny of regular sellers. Is my turning good enough? Again, my experience is not a positive one. As a teacher, when giving feedback on anything, I always try to start with the positives, before discussing the improvements that could be made. I am afraid that too often here only the defects are pointed out.

Attendance at sales has been an issue in the past. Friends at the workshop have told me they have asked to be included in sales only to be told there is no room. When I have visited the sales, at first, I was clearly not welcome, even being asked to move away from the table. Some people are natural sales people; I am not one of them. I am happy to respond if asked a question and will offer advice or alternatives but cannot try to persuade somebody to buy something they did not really want.



This leads me to the thing I find most contentious at sales, that of price. How do you arrive at a price for your items? There are a few considerations such as cost of materials. For some they talk about cost of tools and equipment. Then there is the cost of your time! If you are turning as a hobby can you realistically ask to be paid for your time? So, what is the value of a piece of turned wood? Do value and price

mean the same thing? I once had a member say to me if people were not prepared to pay

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what he thought an item was worth he would rather burn it than reduce the price. If I sell an item, I just want to get my costs back. The cost of labour is irrelevant to me as I produced the item because I want to. I do not turn with the objective of selling. I produce something for my own enjoyment, the pleasure in turning a piece of wood into something useful or ornamental. The time I spend producing an item is my enjoyment and part payment.



I like to make pens. I have been told several times that making pens is not real turning. Each to their own. I do not make pens to sell but I have to admit I do now have rather a lot so I am persuaded by Dom to try the sales on December 5th. The last time I tried to sell pens I was told there was a minimum price of \$20. This was unknown to me and I persisted with my price of \$10. I sold two pens across two days! Imagine if this was a sale at a shopping centre. I cannot imagine sitting for two days just to sell two or three items. Clearly at the end of the day the price is what you think you can get for an item. What you sell it for is the price the purchaser is prepared to pay.

As things stand at present, the prices I can charge are controlled

by the prices that others charge, otherwise I am undercutting. I ask myself would I be prepared to pay \$20 for a basic pen. The kit will have cost me \$2.50 (although I was given a quantity of basic pen kits) and the wood is most likely free, an off cut retrieved from the firewood bin or off the floor of the workshop. Total cost \$2.50 plus about an hour of my time. I would rather sell 20 pens at \$10 than five pens at \$20. This is not to say I do not have pens costing a lot more but the principal is the same.

This highlights another negative experienced at sales. While it is hard to judge a fair price based on the time spent at the lathe, how do we judge time spent at the sale. For me I would find it very difficult to sit at a sale for one or two days. Perhaps that is why when I have visited sales, I have found sellers reading



the newspaper, or doing a crossword. Boredom features strongly in my decision concerning joining a sale.

In my experience there are two types of turners at the club. The first group turn to sell and make money. This does not mean that they don't enjoy what they do, but selling is the main driver. The second group is made up of people who turn for enjoyment but would like to recover the cost of materials. In the past it has been made clear to me that some sales are for the first group and other sales would suit an 'occasional' seller.

So, despite everything I have said above I am looking forward to December 5th when several 'occasional sellers' are joining experienced market sellers. I am sure we will all enjoy the experience.


Everyone is entitled to their opinion, even if it is misguided and poorly researched.

Minutes of the Annual General Meeting held on Saturday 5th October 2019 at the Old Dairy Co-op.

Meeting opened at 1pm by President Peter Hamilton, who welcomed members to the meeting.

Attendance: 37 members, 1 associate, 8 apologies and 1 visitor.

Minutes: The minutes of the previous AGM minutes were published in the August edition of the Hobby Turner. It was moved by Ray Grennan and seconded by Frank Barton that the minutes as published in the August hobby Turner be accepted. Passed.

President's Report: Peter Hamilton presented his report for the year 2018/2019.

The Club has had a very successful year following Ron's previous outstanding tenure when much of the Club's major items of equipment were upgraded. There has been a steady stream of new members, although, sadly, some long time members have been lost to the Club. The large number of people who make significant contributions to the Club were acknowledged. The vital contribution made to the Club by the trainers was especially acknowledged. There is an urgent need for more trainers and a program will be organized early in the New Year for interested members to undertake the necessary training. A brief report was included in the September edition of the Hobby Turner.

It was moved by Bob Norris, seconded by Alan Smith that the report be accepted. Passed.

Treasurer's Report:

Treasurer Garry Buckman tabled the Financial Report for 2018/2019. Garry gave some pertinent figures for the financial year. The club had a good year with considerable income and expenditure and has an overall balance of \$6 654.61 in the operating account. The Financial Report for the year is available to members on request.

Election of Office Bearers: The Chairman declared all positions on the Board vacant and asked for nominations for the new Board. As there were fewer nominations than Board positions to be filled, it was not necessary to conduct a ballot. The roles of President, Secretary and Treasurer were filled by Peter Hamilton, Dom Pirlo and Garry Buckman respectively as there were no other candidates.
